Lowboy Trailers



- Lower center of gravity,
- Easier loading for heavy equipment

Aim for 12,000–20,000 lbs. Know your truck's towing limit. DOT compliance is not optional—get it wrong, and you're paying fines instead of invoices.

Truck Compatibility

Don't buy a trailer that your truck can't pull safely. Match tow ratings, brakes, and hitch type.
